Subject-Verb Agreement: Subject-verb agreement indicates that the subject must agree with the verb that expresses the action, performed by the subject.

e.g.- Hari plays with his ball.

Rules for Sentence formation:

1. Subjects and verbs must agree in number

e.g. The dog growls when he is angry.

2. Prepositional phrases between the subject and verb usually do not affect agreement.

e.g. The colors of the rainbow are beautiful.

3. When the sentence starts with There or Here, the subject will always be placed after the verb.

e.g. There is a problem with the balance sheet.

4. Subjects don't always come before verbs in questions; identify the subject carefully before deciding on the proper verb form to use.

e.g. Where are the pieces of this puzzle.

5. If two subjects are joined by and, they require a plural verb form.

e.g. The cow and the pig are jumping over the moon.

6. The verb is singular if the two subjects separated by and refer to the same person or thing.

e.g. Ragma and rice is my favorite dish.

Types of Sentences: There are four types of sentences.

1. Declarative Sentence state something or make a statement. They end with a full stop.

e.g. I wake up early every morning.

2. Imperative Sentences are used to give orders or instructions, make requests or offer advice.

e.g. (a) Get me a glass of water. (order)

(b) Please get me a glass of water. (request)

3. Exclamatory sentences help us to communicate our feelings or surprise, admiration, shock, wonder and appreciation.

e.g. - Ah! what a delicious meal.

Ooh! I dropped my purse somewhere!

4. Interrogative Sentences ask questions. They end with a question mark.

e.g. Who saved the lion from the hunter?

Where did you go?

Question Tags - Question Tags are short questions used at the end of a sentence, usually to reconfirm.

e.g. They will return tonight, won't they?

Rules for forming question tags:

1. A positive statement is followed by a negative question tag.

e.g. Mary can speak English, can't she?

2. A negative statement is followed by a positive question tag.

e.g. He shouldn't say things like that, should he?
